The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada released its final report in December 2015. This landmark report was the culmination of over 14, 000 personal testimonies and submissions, and 5 years of work by three highly respected Commissioners. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada revealed painful truths concerning the grave harms and human rights abuses experienced by former residential schools students, their families, communities and Indigenous nations. The Commission also provided invaluable insight and guidance on the way forward for Canada, founded in a human-rights based approach.

Canada is committed to the adoption and implementation of the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples without qualification - in Canada and internationally. The Declaration stands as a principled framework for reconciliation and a renewed relationship with Indigenous peoples in Canada. Its full implementation, with Indigenous peoples, will advance justice, dignity and prosperity for all peoples.
